Refurbished Shepparton Hub reopens

On 20 March Uniting Vic.Tas reopened its refurbished Maude Street office in Shepparton.

The space has been designed to make the site more welcoming, inclusive and culturally safe for people accessing our services.



The office houses key services for the area, including youth, multicultural, employment, new arrival support and family violence services.

"We embarked on the refurbishment of this wonderful facility because we wanted to do more. We wanted to give our team and community the opportunity to grow and develop," said Uniting Vic.Tas CEO Bronwyn Pike.

During the refurbishment, services were temporarily relocated to Fryers Street, a nearby Uniting Church site.


"I wanted to thank the Shepparton Uniting Church because being able to relocate round the corner to Fryers Street near the church made it all possible," said Ms Pike.

The 100-year history of op shops

It's almost been 100 years since the name 'Op Shop' was coined by Melbourne show girl Lady Millie Tallis. Hoping to give second hand or charity shops a more dignified name, Millie created the term 'opportunity shop' in 1925. The idea came from the streets of Paris, where bargain shops were known as magasins d'occasion or stores of opportunity.

Today, Uniting operate 20 op shops around Victoria. While primarily a social enterprise, they are much more than just a shop front. They are living homes of the circular economy, access to affordable goods, and modern troves filled with treasure. They are enlivened communities making the world a better place through daily action, creativity, and connection.

Uniting, through its founding agency, Wesley Central Mission, opened its first charity shop in Lonsdale Street (Melbourne) in 1933. By 1939 'Goodwill Industries' had six shops, eight trucks, a warehouse, and 150 employees however this all ended with World War II.

Uniting Op Shops have mostly been established by working with Uniting Church congregations. Our oldest continuing shops are Albert Park which opened in 1964 and Glenroy which opened in 1973.

Your donation bins keep us going

This past financial year, Uniting has been able to sell 526,901 items through our op shops.

Nearly all these items have been donated through our op shops or donation bins — over 40 of which reside on congregation sites.

Your bins and the missional work of your congregation are crucial to the success of our op shops and the funding of Uniting programs.
